Furthering her administration's commitment to provide an open and transparent government, County Executive MaryEllen Odell has prepared an itemized list showing precisely where property tax dollars will be spent pursuant to the 2014 adopted County Budget.

"We believe it is important to note that out of every \$100 of County property taxes raised, \$73.31 goes to federal and state mandated programs over which we in the County have no control," said Odell.

The top dollar draining unfunded mandates on the list are expenses billed to the County by Medicaid and the Putnam County Correctional Facility. These two line items account for almost 20 percent of a resident's property tax bill with Medicaid consuming \$9.72 out of every \$100 collected and jail absorb another \$9.56 of that same \$100 collected.

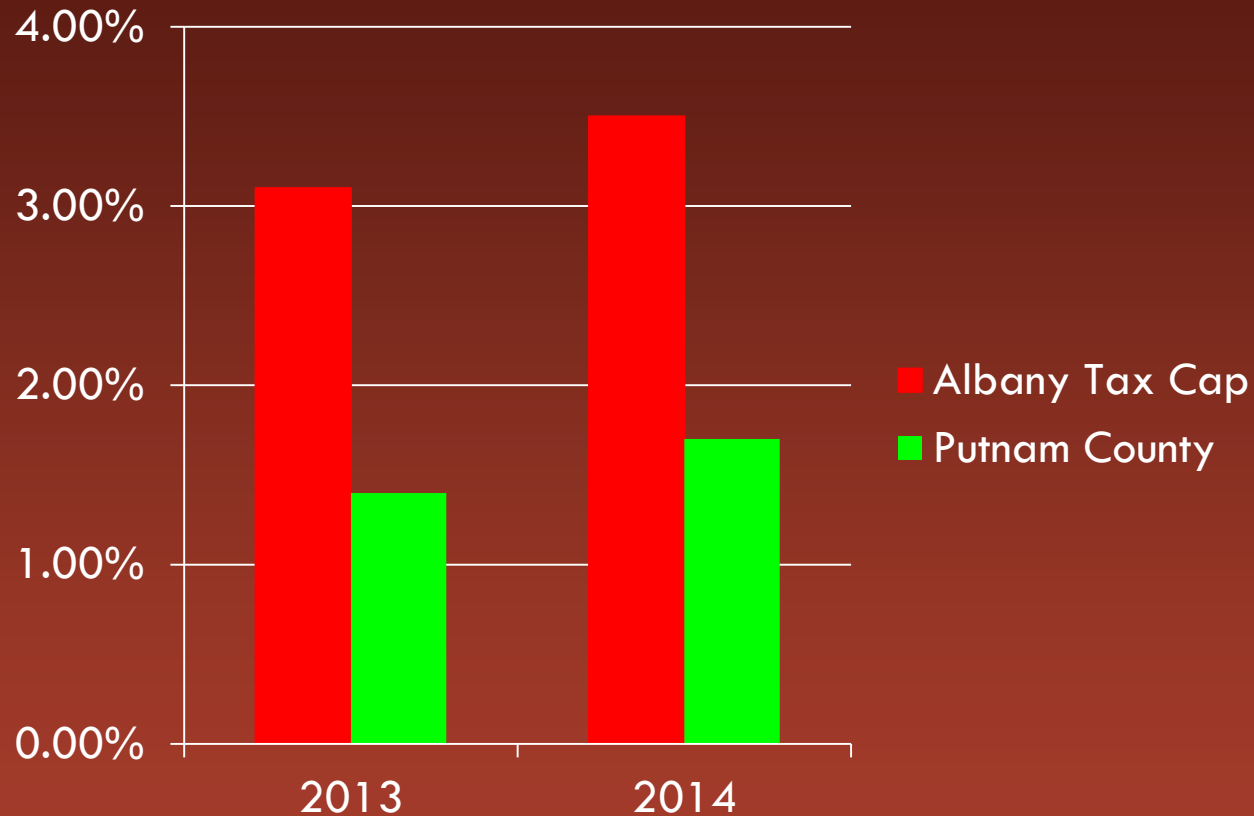

- We are committed to submitting a 2015 budget that will come in under the Albany tax cap



Putnam's Economy

- This fiscal responsibility has allowed us to use \$1M to strengthen the Insurance Reserve Fund and \$3.5M to pay down debt owed to the NYS Retirement System, the County has a general fund balance of \$18.4 M as of December 31, 2013, exceeding recommended standards
- Our strong fund balance and high bond rating enabled the County to save \$2M in bond interest costs over the last 2 years

Putnam County has 6,231 residents who are enrolled in Medicaid, a health-care program for the poor and disabled. The county's portion of the bill is about \$10 million a year, with the remainder covered by federal and state funding, for a total about \$97 million. New York is one of the only states that requires counties to pay a portion of Medicaid. County officials have been asking the state to take over the local portion, saying the cost drains their budgets. With the high cost of Medicaid in mind, Putnam last year contracted with the Bonadio Group, a consulting firm with offices throughout New York, to work with its employees who review complicated Medicaid cases in terms of eligibility.

The contract is capped at \$25,000, and the county so far has spent \$16,425, according to William Carlin, finance commissioner. The cost is covered by a combination of state and federal funding, he said.

Saving the county money

As of Dec. 31, 2013, the Bonadio Group and county employees either discovered abuse or the applicant withdrew the application in 22 cases involving 67 applicants for Medicaid and a subsidized health program for people whose incomes were too high for regular Medicaid. In another four cases involving 14 applicants, income was recalculated in the county's favor. The 26 cases represented 72.2 percent of the 36 cases that were reviewed. The cost avoidance as a result of those findings is \$636,218 a year.

Anti-Fraud Initiatives

Worker's Compensation and Unemployment Insurance

- In 2014 alone, we face \$700,000 in expenses to pay for the alleged injuries sustained by employees over the last 10+ years
- Upon identifying potential “gaming” in our Worker's Compensation program, we have initiated a program to investigate and continually scrutinize all claims
- Accordingly, we have engaged a new service provider (POMCO) to help us ensure that benefits continue for those who are truly injured and unable to work
- Additional effort is being placed upon reviewing unemployment claims for similar “gaming” – already we have saved \$40,000

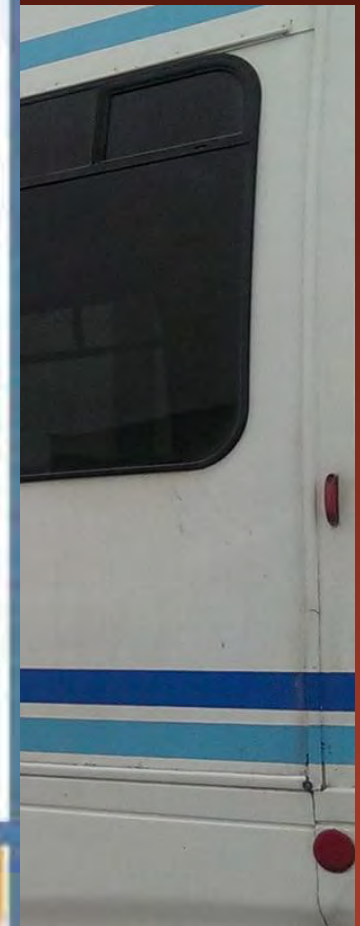

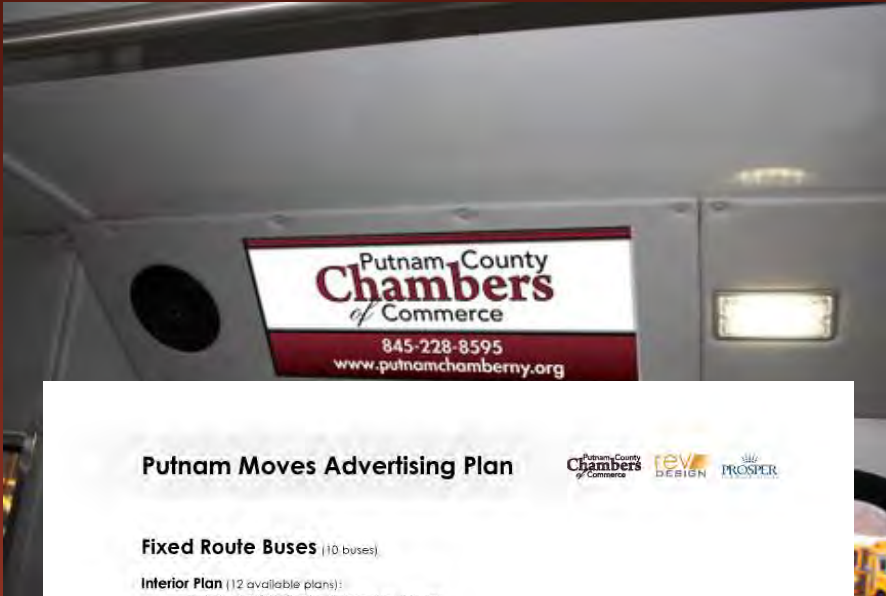

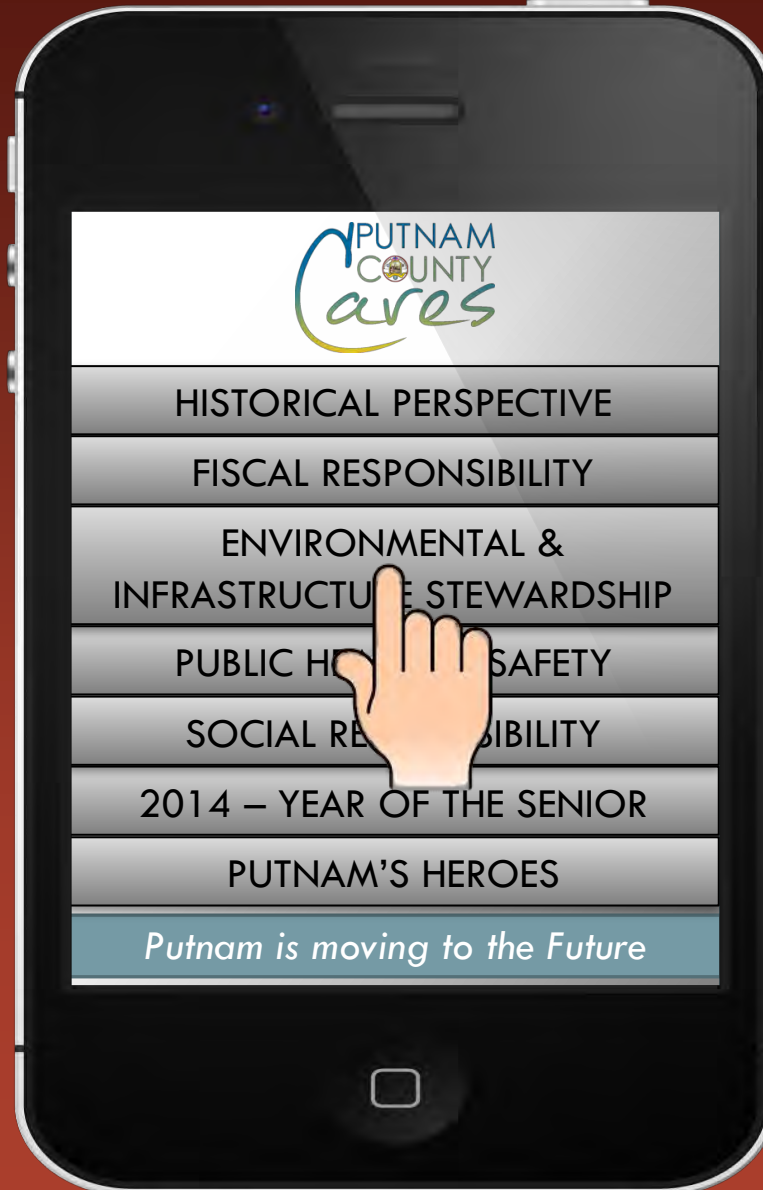

Do Your Golf Clubs FIT You?

Did you know that 80%-90% of all golfers play with clubs that don't fit them? Many people don't realize that many poor shots are caused by equipment that doesn't fit. Here are a few things to consider whether you are just starting out or an accomplished player.

Choosing a Grip

Did you know that too small of a grip can make the ball go to the left and too large of a grip can make the ball go to the right? This can be fixed by custom fitting the grip size to your hand so you can grip the club properly which will produce straighter more solid shots. There are many styles of grips to choose from. You should choose one that feels good in your hands when you hold it. Your grips should be replaced every year to ensure a good hold on the club.

Choosing a Shaft

There are many varieties of golf shafts to choose from graphite, steel, titanium, and many other new materials that technology is offering. There are many things to take into consideration when choosing the right golf shaft. Some of these are: material, length, flexes, flex point, butt and tip diameter. If the shaft flex is too strong or too weak, it can produce wild erratic shots with even a good swing. If the tip flex is too high, your ball flight will be low. If the tip flex is too low, your ball flight may be too high. If the shaft is too long or too short, it can affect your posture during your setup giving you almost no chance at hitting a solid straight shot.

Choosing a Club Head

There are many different styles of clubs to choose from. Choose whatever club looks the best to you, and make sure it has enough weight to feel the club head. Many knock off clubs have extremely light heads that will not perform consistently. There are two types of clubs to choose from, blades or perimeter-weighted clubs. Either will produce the desired ball flight if hit properly. There are also many woods to choose from. Woods are mainly made out of steel, titanium and graphite; however you can still find real wooden clubs in the bags of even the best players. Woods come in all shapes and sizes. It is important that you pick a design that looks good to you. If you are not confident with the club, you will not be confident when it is time to make a shot with that club.

Proper Lie Angle

Did you know that the lie angle of the club could cause shots to go off line? A club that is too flat can cause the toe of the club dig into the ground causing the shot to go right. A club that is too upright will cause the heel of the club to dig into the ground causing the shot to go left. There are several ways to check this; however the best way is to have your clubs checked by a professional. Then, using a loft lie machine bend them to the proper lie angle. By bending them, we will get the center of the club to hit the ground, which will produce a square divot that is the same depth from heel to toe. Lie angle is measured in degrees in relationship to the ground. There is no right or wrong lie angle, only the one that fits your swing.

Proper Loft Angle

The loft of the club is simply how many degrees the face angle is in relationship to the ground. A driver will have approximately 7 to 14 degrees of loft while a wedge will have 50 to 60 degrees of loft. Loft is important because it will allow you to control the distance of your shots. You must be careful when adjusting the loft of a club because it can create a dig or bounce sole that can ruin the characteristics of your clubs design. If you plan to change the loft of a club, consult a professional.

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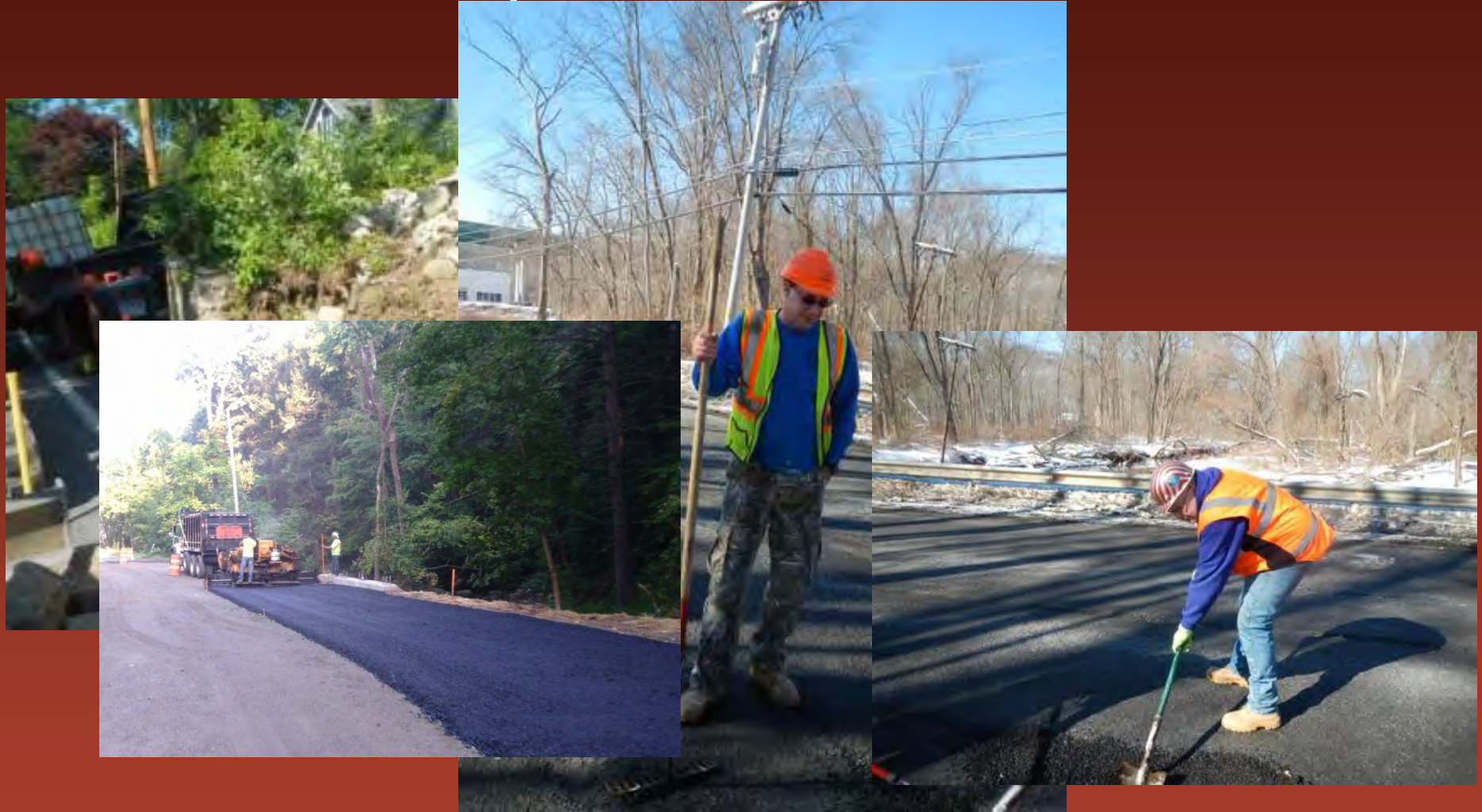

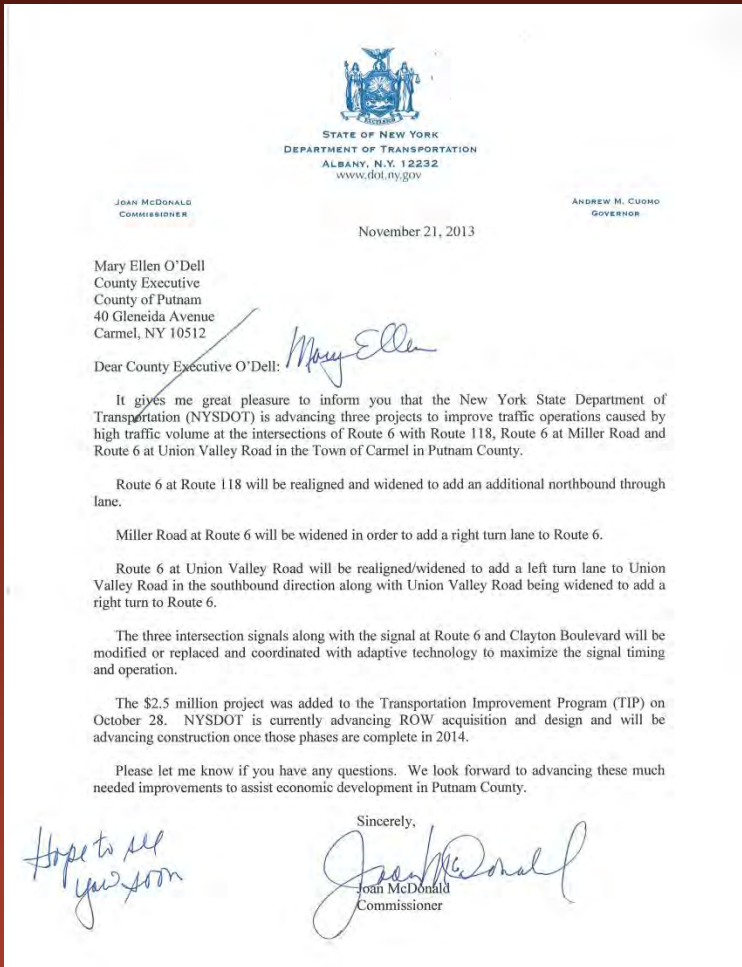


Initiative to Utilize State-of-the-Art Planning for County Roads

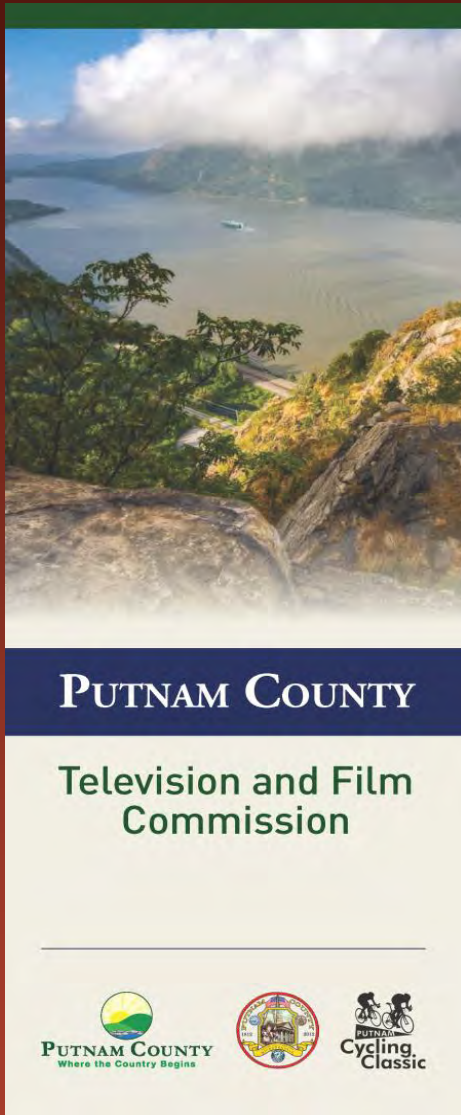

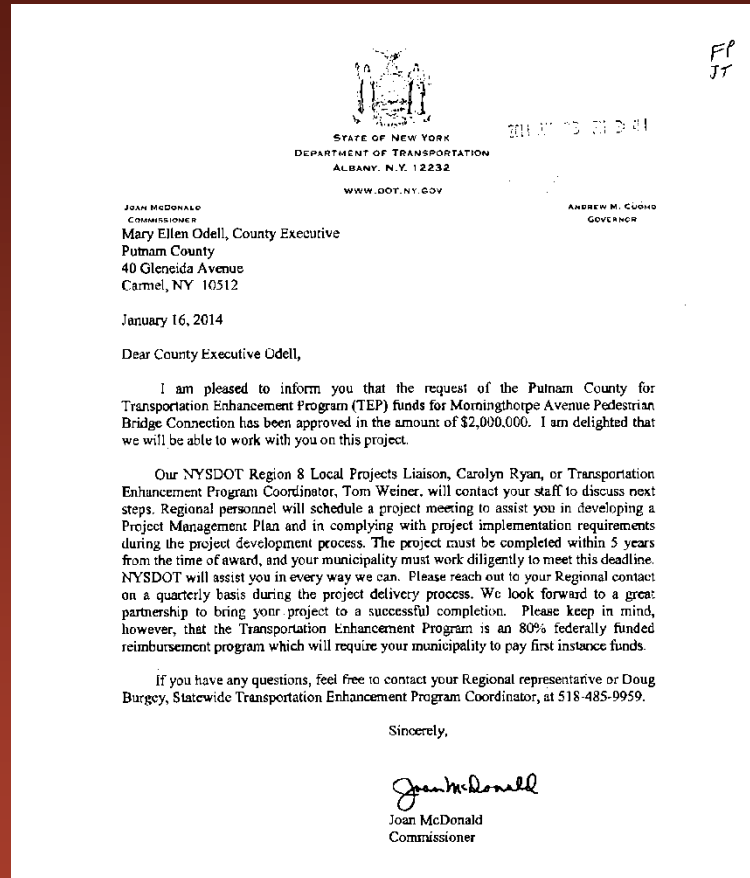

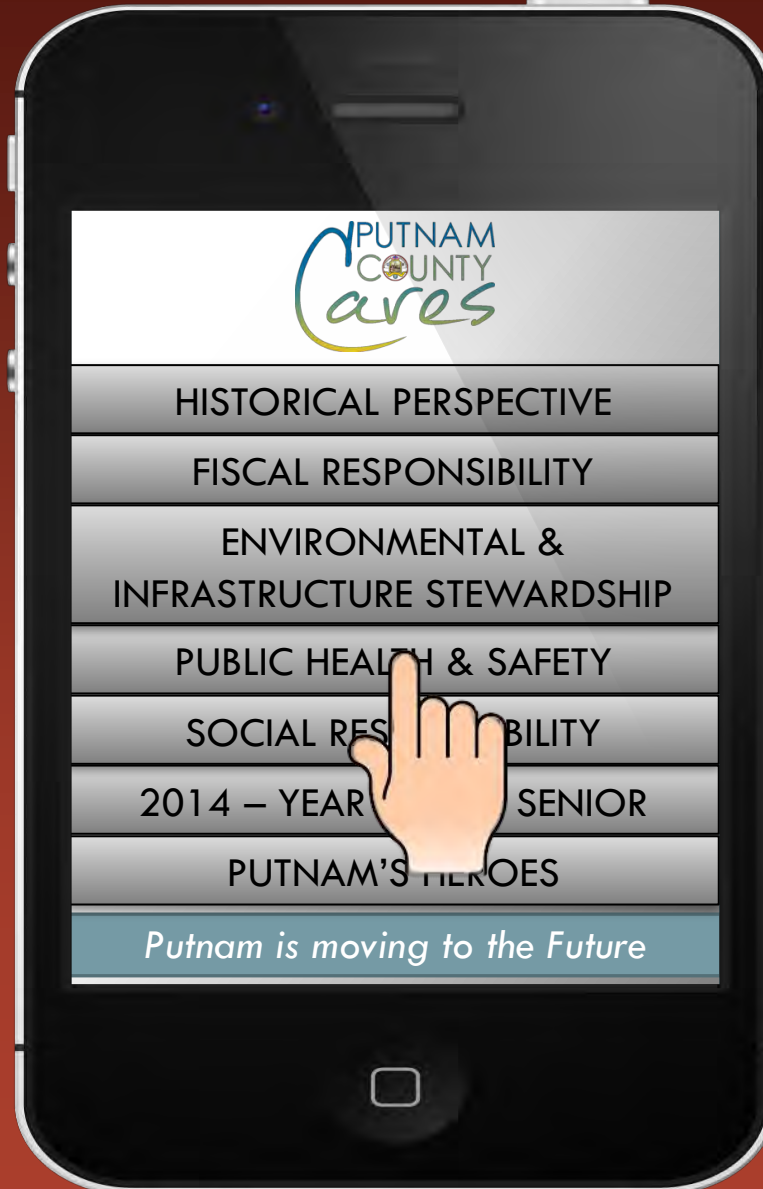

Lawmakers in Putnam County say the Journal News can have the county's list of 11,000 registered gun owners to print publicly – when it prides the list from their cold, dead hands.

“There will no retreat, and there will be no surrender,” said Putnam County Executive MaryEllen Odell of the county's decision not to release the information.

Putnam County Clerk Dennis Sant received a written request in December from the Journal News of Westchester, seeking the names and addresses of all registered gun owners in the county, which, according to the Freedom of Information Law, is public information.

Sant, who has been the county clerk for 35 years, had 20 days to answer the FOIL the request.

However, during that time, Sant learned that the names and addresses of gun owners in Westchester and Rockland counties that were obtained by the newspaper were used to create a Google map on the Internet that identifies where each legal gun owner lives. He also received numerous phone calls

from residents of those counties, as well as Putnam, urging him not to give up the information.

So Sant denied the request.

During a Jan. 3 press conference at the Historic Courthouse in Carmel, Sant told reporters that his position on the FOIL request has not been an easy one to take, but that he is thankful for the support he's received from local and state leaders.

“I'm a man who follows the rule of law,” he said. “I've never denied a FOIL request in my 28 years as a FOIL officer ... But it's not about the rule of law anymore, we're talking about the safety of citizens.”

Odell told reporters she wanted to make Putnam's message clear, not only to the Journal News, but to all media outlets that the county stands firm in its response.

“We will not be complying with the FOIL request from the Journal News,” she said. “This issue is strictly, strictly about providing safety to our law-abiding citizens.”

She added that the county is

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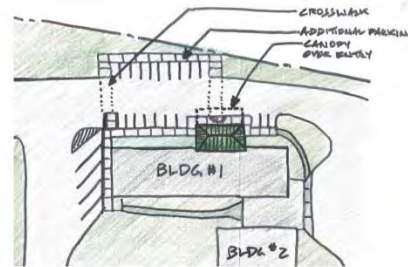

A new state law authorizes School Districts to determine if they want to give Veterans a partial exemption on their School Taxes, exactly like Veterans receive from their town property taxes. Each School Board has to hold a public hearing to determine the feasibility of such a change. After the public hearing they vote on the issue. This is not a mandatory tax reduction, each School Board decides if they want to give this to the Veterans. The fiscal impact will be one of the deciding factors. We will be helping the local Veterans in each school district with what they may need to say to at the public hearings. Please try to attend one of these meetings. The Veterans and their supporters who attended the better. This does not matter if it is your school district or not. The Veterans Board of education unanimously approved the Veterans Exemption at their February 4, 2014 meeting. This makes them one of the first school boards to approve this exemption.

Thanks and a salute to the Board of Education of Brewster and to the Board of Education of Carmel. Each held a Public Hearing this past Tuesday regarding the property tax exemptions for Veterans on school

It was my pleasure to be at the Carmel BOE meeting and to see Art was at the Brewster BOE as a speaker. Sadly this is another in a long line of unfunded mandates that spill out of Albany. The only thing that was different from the other mandates was that it was optional. The school board could reject the exemption. At the Carmel Public Hearing several Veterans spoke and each had a slightly different take on why this exemption should be given. However the core theme for several was the same: "...it is the right thing to do". This was what resonated the most with the Carmel BOE. They voted unanimously to pass



the resolution granting the Veterans Exemption at the Brewster Public hearing. Art reported that everything was about the same. Both Veterans and non-Veterans property owners spoke in favor of the exemption. With one non-Veteran saying that Veterans have not gotten their what they deserve since 1775. It was a unanimous vote with one abstention in favor of the exemption. Both boards have to work out the details of the exemptions in their respective districts. The information needed by qualifying Veterans will be available soon at the Carmel School Board and from your local Brewster and Carmel District offices and from your local assessor. We hope the other School Districts in Putnam County will follow the lead of Brewster and Carmel.

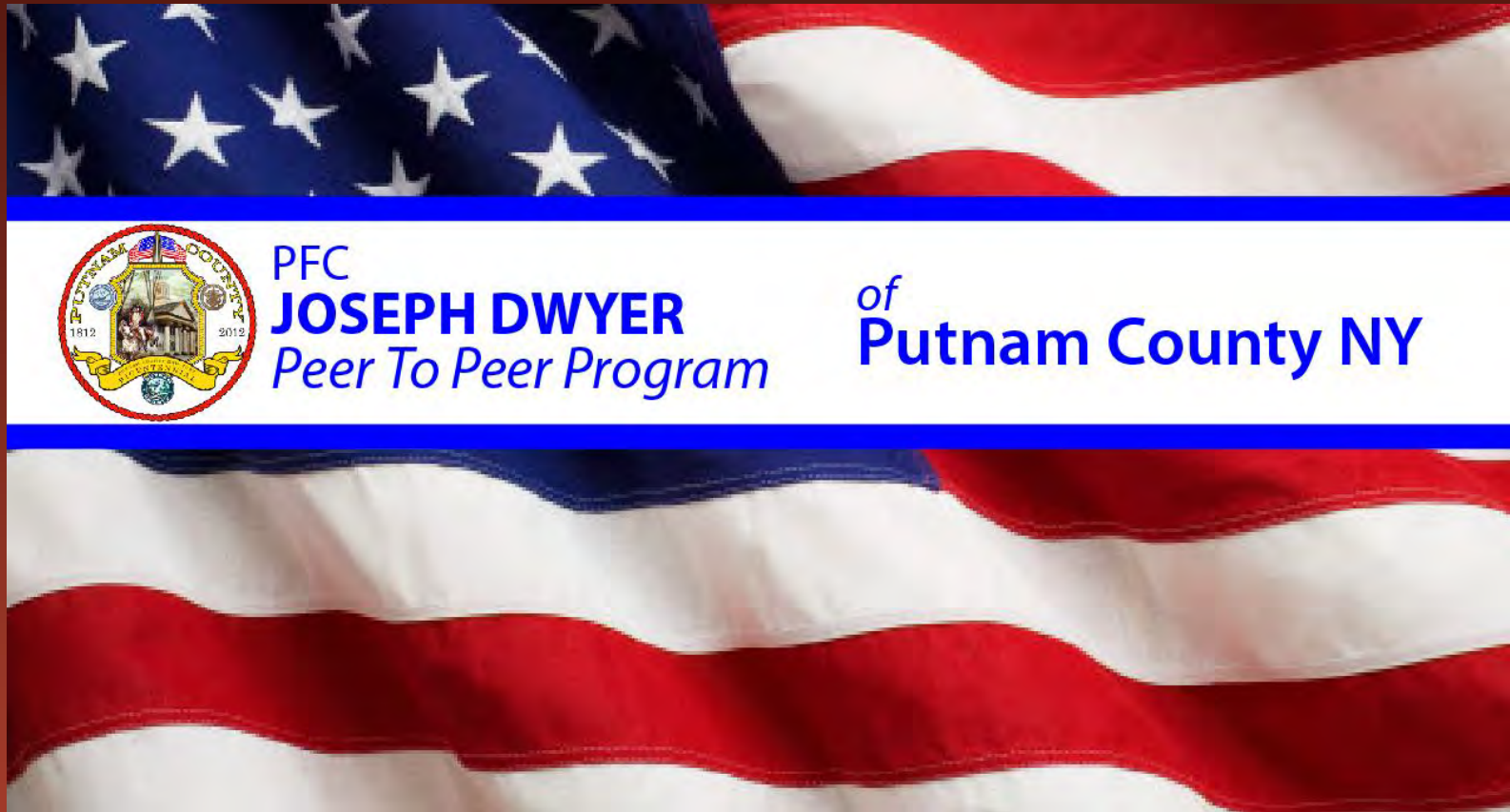

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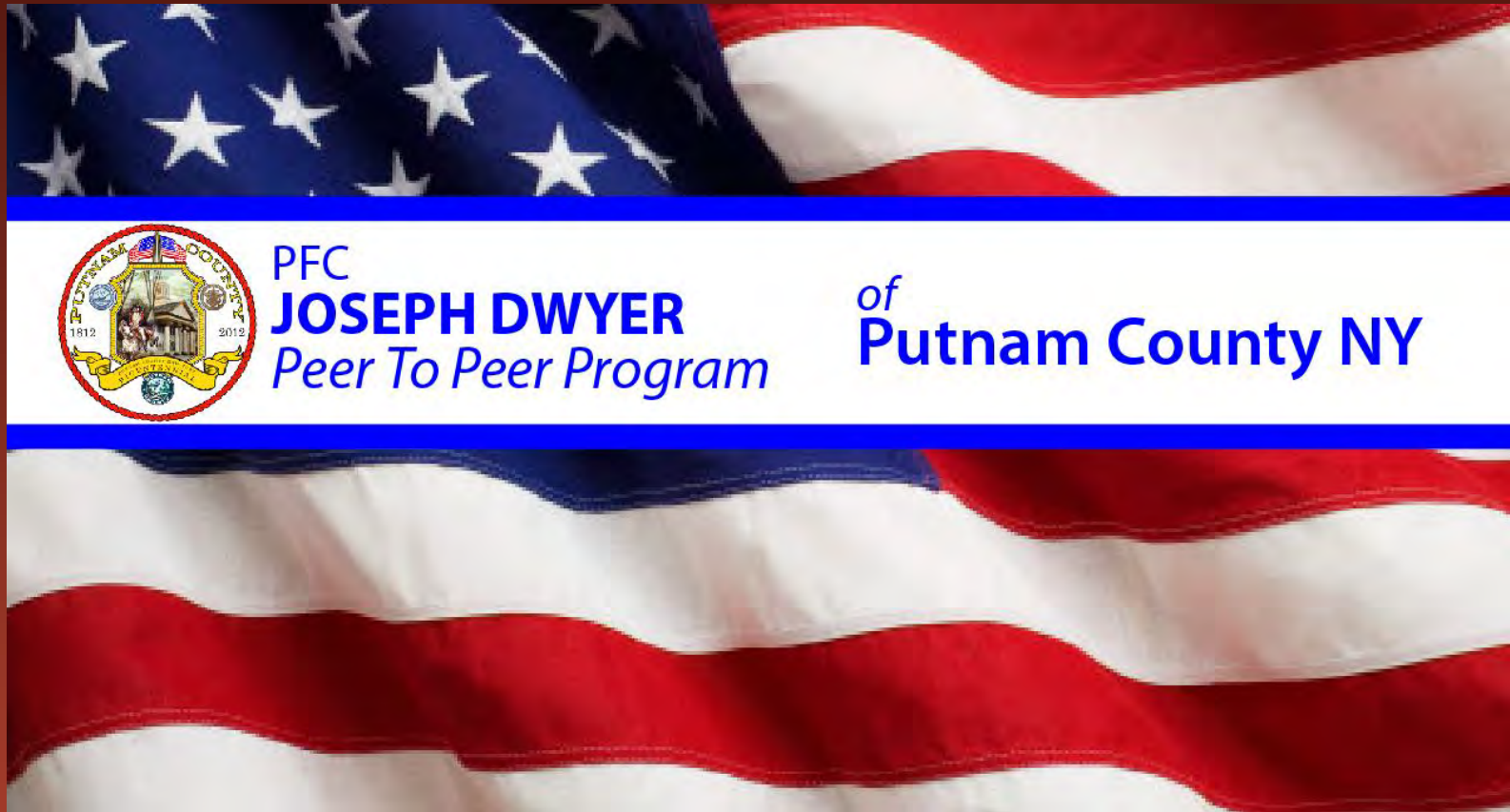
