This informative chart reveals that for every \$100 in property taxes raised, \$70 goes to support Federal & State mandated programs





Every year that I have been in office I have submitted a budget by the October 1st deadline that is under the Albany Tax Cap





- In addition to being <u>under</u> the Albany tax cap by more than 50%, we have also <u>under</u> spent our budget in the years 2012 and 2013
- We also anticipate <u>under-spending</u> the 2014 budget
- We are committed to submitting a 2015 budget that will come in <u>under</u> the Albany tax cap



- This fiscal responsibility has allowed us to use \$1M to strengthen the Insurance Reserve Fund and \$3.5M to pay down debt owed to the NYS Retirement System, the County has a general fund balance of \$18.4 M as of December 31, 2013, exceeding recommended standards
- Our strong fund balance and high bond rating enabled the County to save \$2M in bond interest costs over the last 2 years

On-going Litigation

- With the unanimous approval by the Putnam County Legislature and support from Sheriff Smith, we are continuing our effort to return property located along Stoneleigh Avenue back to the taxpayer
- This would allow us to return 35+ acres of sewered and watered property overlooking the reservoir that is presently in violation of its intended use back onto the tax rolls and provide jobs



As reported in the Journal News by the Government Watchdog on February 23, 2014

"Putnam Tackles Medicaid Abuse"



Putnam County has 6,231 residents who are enrolled in Medicaid, a health-care program for the poor and disabled. The county's portion of the bill is about \$10 million a year, with the remainder covered by federal and state funding, for a total of about \$97 million. New York is one of the only states that requires counties to pay a portion of Medicaid.







The contract is capped at \$25,000, and the county so far has spent \$16,425, according to William Carlin, finance commissioner. The cost is covered by a combination of state and federal funding, he said.



As of December 31, 2013, the Bonadio Group and county employees either discovered abuse or the applicant withdrew the application in 22 cases involving 67 applicants for Medicaid.






The cases represented 72.2 percent of the 36 cases that were reviewed. The cost avoidance as a result of those findings is \$636,218 a year.


The Bonadio Group reviewed the case of a family of five that is eligible for Medicaid, despite owning a \$1 million house and a condominium they get rental income from



The parents are selfemployed and have a \$500,000 line of credit on their home. They have retirement accounts, but they would be penalized for making early withdrawals. They appear to have overseas savings.

Ridding the system of "gamers" protects the needy by making sure their benefits continue, she said.



Tonight, I am calling on our Federal & State Legislators to dose this loophole with legislation that would require all assets to be calculated when determining eligibility.

And while we wait for that, we are expanding our contract with Bonadio to include a review of long term care applications as well.





Anti-Fraud Initiatives

Worker's Compensation and Unemployment Insurance

- In 2014 alone, we face \$700,000 in expenses to pay for the alleged injuries sustained by employees over the last 10+ years
- Upon identifying potential "gaming" in our Worker's Compensation program, we have initiated a program to investigate and continually scrutinize all claims
- Accordingly, we have engaged a new service provider (POMCO) to help us ensure that benefits continue for those who are truly injured and unable to work
- Additional effort is being placed upon reviewing unemployment claims for similar "gaming" – already we have saved \$40,000

- The County held to its responsibility and funded \$7 M to the programs
- This program provides services to 422 special needs children
- Transportation costs for 72 children are \$2.3 M alone
- Putnam County Cares and therefore supported PARC with an additional \$300,000 to keep their doors open







- In total, all of our mandates consume 70% of our local property tax dollars and our sales tax revenue
- There is no local control with how the programs are administered
- NY State mandates are inflexible and inefficient
- And we are not alone, just ask our Sheriff or any Town Supervisor, Town Board, Village Mayor, Village Board, School Superintendent and Boards of Education how mandates effect their budgets year after year

Initiative to Utilize State-of-the-Art Planning for County Roads

- Working with Cornell University the County is developing an overall strategy that evaluates and prioritizes each of the 62 County roads
- This strategy identifies specific remediation and maintenance opportunities for each of the roads that make up the total of 117 Miles
- This new strategy is designed to extend the life-span of each of our roads to 15 years, so that we can avoid unnecessary bonding and expenses
- Historically, the planning for roads has been designed around a 10 year life-span; and, many of our roads have not met that goal

Dear County Executive O'Dell:

It gives me great pleasure to inform you that the New York State Department of Transpartation (NYSDOT) is advancing three projects to improve traffic operations caused by high traffic volume at the intersections of Route 6 with Route 118, Route 6 at Miller Road and Route 6 at Union Valley Road in the Town of Carmel in Putnam County.

Route 6 at Route 118 will be realigned and widened to add an additional northbound through lane.

Miller Road at Route 6 will be widened in order to add a right turn lane to Route 6.

Route 6 at Union Valley Road will be realigned/widened to add a left turn lane to Union Valley Road in the southbound direction along with Union Valley Road being widened to add a right turn to Route 6.

The three intersection signals along with the signal at Route 6 and Clayton Boulevard will be modified or replaced and coordinated with adaptive technology to maximize the signal timing and operation.

The \$2.5 million project was added to the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) on October 28. NYSDOT is currently advancing ROW acquisition and design and will be advancing construction once those phases are complete in 2014.

Please let me know if you have any questions. We look forward to advancing these much needed improvements to assist economic development in Putnam County.





Sant Pledges to Protect Privacy of Gun Owners Putnam Refuses to Give up Names and Addresses for Publication

Lawmakers in Putnam County say the Journal News can have the county's list of 11,000 registered gun owners to print publicly - when it pries the list from their cold, dead

"There will no retreat, and there will be no surrender," said Putnam County Executive MaryEllen Odell of the county's decision not to release the information.

Putnam County Clerk Dennis Sant received a written request in December from the Journal News of Westchester, seeking the names and addresses of all registered gun owners in the county, which, according to the Freedom of Information Law, is public information.

Sant, who has been the county clerk for 35 years, had 20 days to answer the FOIL the request.

However, during that time, Sant learned that the names and addresses of gun owners in Westchester and Rockland counties that were obtained by the newspaper were used to create a Google map on the Internet that identifies where each legal gun owner lives. He also received numerous phone calls

from residents of those counties, as well as Putnam, urging him not to give up the information.

So Sant denied the request.

During a Jan. 3 press conference at the Historic Courthouse in Carmel, Sant told reporters that his position on the FOIL request has not been an easy one to take, but that he is thankful for the support he's received from local and state leaders.

"I'm a man who follows the rule of law," he said. "I've never denied a FOIL request in my 28 years as a FOIL officer ... But it's not about the rule of law anymore, we're talking about the safety of citizens."

Odell told reporters she wanted to make Putnam's message clear. not only to the Journal News, but to all media outlets that the county stands firm in its response.

"We will not be complying with the FOIL request from the Journal News," she said. "This issue is strictly, strictly about providing safety to our law-abiding citizens."

Our commitment to protecting your privacy & safety was challenged in a lawsuit brought against the County in late 2013, but my administration did not back down from this fight.





We recently learned, however, that the State Supreme Court ruled against the County's stand to protect privacy & safety. This Decision will not deter my commitment to preserve a person's right to privacy & safety in Putnam, which is why I intend to file an Appeal.

The 2A mendment

A well regulated militia, being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms, shall not be infringed.



It is also time for Albany to recognize that the NY SAFE Act is impossibly flawed, and I will continue to urge lawmakers to take our taxpayer's privacy rights as seriously as we do here in Putnam.
